Reading Challenges

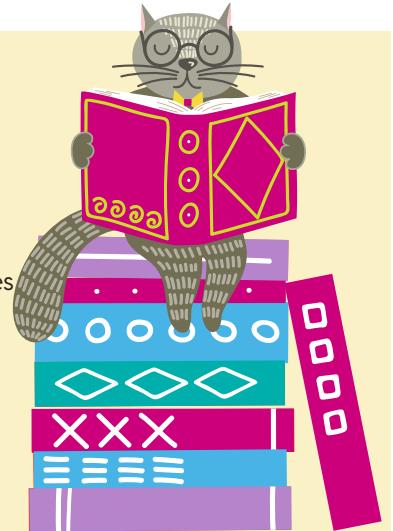
1000 Books Before Kindergarten
