eveloped by our team of educators and librarians, Stepping Stones to Milestones is a cohesive storytime experience. We aim to help children get ready to start school and to position parents and caregivers as their child's first teacher. During storytime early literacy development is supported and modeled through these five practices.

- 1. Singing
- 2. Talking
- 3. Reading
- 4. Writing
- 5. Playing

These practices that build a rich literacy environment are easy to do and can be done anywhere.

Create a pretend play area

that encourages children to act out everyday scenarios like doctor visits or shopping for groceries. This type of

play provides children with the opportunity to talk to other children or adults.

Babies: Jingle! Jingle! Jingle, jingle, jingle (bounce baby on your knee)

Try these songs or rhymes at home!

Sleigh bells ringing-here we go! Jingle, jingle, jingle Pony's fast.... Pony's slow (bounce quickly then slowly)

Jingle, jingle, jingle, jingle (bounce baby on your knee) Can you feel the cold wind blow? (Blow on baby) Jingle, jingle, jingle Slipping, sliding on the snow! (Swerve and dip baby) Whoa!

Toddlers: Frost

(Sung to "The farmer in the Dell")

The frost is on the roof (point hands over head) The frost is on the ground (point to the floor) The frost is on the window (make a window with your hands)

The frost is all around (make large circles with hands)

Preschool: Warm Mittens

I wiggle my left mitten (wave hand) I wiggle my right (wave hand) Inside of my mittens (make "mitten" hands) So warm and so tight

I wiggle my pinkie (wiggle pinkie) I wiggle my thumbs (wiggle thumbs)

So when I make snowballs (cup hands together) My hands don't get numb (shake out hands)

Talk

Early childhood is a critical time in a children's brain development with over 85% of physical brain growth occurring during the first three years. It is also a critical time for language acquisition. All children, beginning at birth, need adults who intentionally guide and support language development. Some ways to do that are:

- Talk to your child often. Your child loves to hear your voice and it helps them learn. Talk about what you are doing and about the things all around you.
- Ask your child open-ended questions that require thinking like "Where do wild animals go at night?"
- Take turns talking and give your child time to respond. Expand on what your child says.
- Use interesting words to describe things.
- Make eye contact.
- Discuss pictures in books.
