These practices that build a rich literacy environment are easy to do and can be done anywhere.

#### Make a homemade kazoo.

Cover the end of a cardboard tube from a paper towel or toilet paper roll with wax paper and secure it with a rubber band. Poke a hole in the side of the cardboard tube with using a sharp pencil or other tool with a sharp




