

**Early writing skills** begins in infancy when babies begin to build the fine motor skills needed to write. There are varied activities that build finger strength and motor skills. Here are a few you can do at home.

- Have children grasp and hold toys like rattles and shaky eggs.
- Provide blocks and other building toys for children to explore.
- Do fingerplays together like "Where is Thumbkin?" Encourage children to move each finger individually as you do the rhyme.
- Provide time throughout the day for children to draw, scribble, and write.
- Encourage early art play.
- Display your child's artwork.
- Paint with water on the sidewalk.
- Play with playdough.
- Help your child trace lines with their pointer finger.

## **Mess Free Painting**

Use an empty plastic jar like one from a large jar of peanut butter, some beans, some washable paint, and a sheet of paper or card stock cut to fit inside the jar. Add a few drops of paint to the bottom of the jar, add a handful of the beans, and carefully place the paper inside so it wraps around the sides. Close the lid tightly and have children shake the jar. Remove the paper after they are done shaking and allow to the paint to dry.
